Get Rid of Unwanted or Unused Gift Cards

Did you get gift cards for Christmas that you can't use or don't want? Or maybe you have some old gift cards from previous holidays that you'll never redeem. Surprisingly, about a third of the gift cards given each year are not used. Since 2008 this has added up to \$44 billion worth of cards that have never been redeemed, even though gift cards are the most requested holiday present.

What do you do with all this valuable, unwanted plastic? You turn it into cash! According to *AARP Magazine*, several merchants, such as Macy's and Barnes & Noble, will buy these unused cards at a discount off their face value. Then these merchants resell the cards to others. Or you can go online. If you type gift card exchange in Google, a number of websites will pop up that buy, sell or exchange gift cards. Online websites such as Cardpool.com, Cardhub.com, Cardcash.com and Giftcardgranny.com buy and sell gift cards at a discount. As long as the company is still in business, you can strike a deal.

Most of the online gift card exchanges will send you a check or give you PayPal credit, or you can swap your unwanted cards for some cards you'll use. Typically, you receive 65 to 92 percent of the face value, but the cards you want to exchange need at least a \$10 issued amount to be eligible.

Take Advantage of Unwanted Gifts

What do you do with those gifts that you don't want? Get a tax deduction! Give them to Goodwill, the Salvation Army or local charities and church thrift shops that could use them. If you'd rather have cash in your pocket, Craigslist and eBay will sell virtually anything. For those clothes still sitting in their gift boxes, you may be able to swap them using websites such as Swapstyle.com, Rehashclothes.com and Dignswap.com. To get cash for electronics, try Gazelle.com and Nextworth.

Need Some Extra Cash?

Try the Money Challenge, an idea found in a recent *AARP Magazine*. Set aside just \$1 the first week, \$2 the next week, \$3 the third week and so on till the final week when you're putting \$52 aside. At the end of the year, you'll have saved a total of \$1,378!
