

I. Buying a new or used car can be a risky impulse purchase, according to the AARP magazine. They suggest that you be prepared when buying a car by following these simple procedures:

- 1. **Do your research**. Know what the car is worth before you test-drive. (See below.)
- 2. Don't buy their timeline. Do not believe the salesperson if they tell you that the price is only good for today.
- **3.** Create some competition. Get quotes from nearby dealers for the same type of vehicle.
- **4. Find you own loan**. Credit unions can often beat dealer originated deals. Get the financing first, so you can focus on features and price without being distracted by so-called "deals".

The Martha Greene Summer Scholarship

The Martha Greene Summer Scholarship program began in 2008. That spring President Mary Reeser urged us to come up with a way to honor and remember the services of our colleague Martha Greene.

Martha worked for 44 years with Talbot County Public School, beginning as a teacher of a one room segregated school house near Unionville, Maryland. Martha did so much more than teach her students. Her former students and Unionville residents regarded her as the matriarch of the village. Martha walked three and a half miles to school and back in all kinds of weather. She made oatmeal, soup, cocoa, and jello with milk for her students. Mrs. Greene also personally raised money so she could organize and finance a summer "field" trip so her students would have an enrichment activity during their vacations.

TCRSPA modeled our Martha Greene Summer Scholarship on this aspect of Martha's dedication to her students. Since 2008 we have funded enrichment experiences for nine local middle schoolers, who would not otherwise have been able to do so.

The children have attended theatre programs, ecology camp, athletic activities at our local YMCA, sailing, pottery and other art programs. Initially we received funding through the generosity of Verizon Maryland and DC. One of Martha's former students, president of Verizon at the time, helped make this available. In the last two years, we received funds through Debbie Urry from the Higher Education Center at Chesapeake College, and also through the donations of our own members. We hope to continue this scholarship in the years to come.

As you may know, our organization sponsors a summer scholarship for Talbot County middle schoolers. We honor our late colleague Martha Raye Greene for her dedication to our less-privileged youth.

In 2012 Alyssa Lucero, our most recent recipient, participated in a painting program at the Arts Academy. Since 2008 TCRSPA has enabled nine students from Easton and Saint Michaels middle schools to attend programs at various local facilities; i.e. Avalon theatre, the YMCA, Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum, Claybakers, and Pickering Creek.

Once again, this summer of 2013 we plan on awarding at least one scholarship for an enrichment program of the student's choice. We thank all of our generous members who have donated to this cause, as well as Debbie Urry at the Higher Education Center at Chesapeake College. Last year we lost the corporate funding we had been relying on, so we are very grateful for your help!
