In Memory of Clara C. Schlotzhauer

Clara C. Schlotzhauer passed peacefully, Tuesday, May 31, 2011, in her home in Cordova. She was a lifelong resident of Talbot County and the Cordova area. Born on a farm near Newtown, on February 5, 1923, she was the daughter of the late Joseph Raymond and Alphonso Estella Gott Callahan.

She completed her elementary grades in the One-Room Schoolhouse at Longwoods and graduated from Cordova High School at the age of 16. She was the youngest member of her class in 1939. She married Chris Robert Schlotzhauer, Jr. on March 31, 1948, who passed away on April 16, 1974. They worked side-by-side with their children for many years on the family's dairy and grain farm. Clara was also a homemaker and a talented seamstress.

Clara's work experiences included serving as an Army Air Force Recognition Officer, teaching in Longwoods School, and working as a Grounds Observer as well as in Atkinson Dress Store in Easton. She retired from her work for Talbot County Public Schools in 1997 at age 75.

Clara was a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church. She served as Secretary of Cordova High School Alumni Association, and was President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer of Cordova PTA.

She was an honorary member of the MD Congress of Parent and Teacher, Inc., 1964 County Queen of Hearts, a life member of the Food Service Association, a past Vice President of Talbot County Farm Bureau Women's Committee and served on the Board of Directors of Talbot Agricultural Center.

A Funeral Liturgy was held Monday, June 6, at 10 a.m. at St. Joseph's in Cordova.

Remembering Connie Rathell... Life Is Good!

This summer Eileen Kuehn, Jennifer Wheeler and I spent an afternoon visiting with an old friend and colleague, Connie Rathell, at her historical home near Skipton, MD. We had come for the purpose of interviewing her for the first " feature teacher profile" of this year's Little Red School House Newsletter . Eileen, Jennifer and I had taught with Connie in the 1980s at Easton Middle School .All of us had so much fun laughing and remembering funny incidences that happened there, that the time just flew by with out us taking very many notes. Connie came to our rescue and later wrote down the basic history of her life. Connie, as always the perfect lady, served us tea and cookies while sharing her life memories. Just being in her beautifully restored home filled with antiques set the scene for listening to her life experiences. I had just read the book "Clara and Mr. Tiffany" so I especially appreciated seeing her original antique Tiffany lamps. The light from these lamps set the tone for a wonderful afternoon of listening about her full life AS ONLY CONNIE RATHELL CAN TELL IT . . .

"I was born September 4, 1927 in Easton, MD. I went to school at Queen Anne County Elementary . On good weather days, I enjoyed "unsupervised outside playtime"

from 10:30 a.m. to 10:45 a.m., and from 12:30 p.m. to 1:00p.m. and again at 2:15 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. recess. Otherwise we stayed in and played indoor games. Q.A. Elementary School included grades 1-7. Tri- County High School in Queen Anne had grades 8-11. Fall activities included outdoor games of field hockey for girls and soccer ball for the boys. In the spring girls played volley ball and boys played baseball. In inclement weather recesses ping pong, darts and dancing were popular. In the winter and early spring, we had many Friday night dances from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. with music from a juke box with songs by Benny Goodman, Harry James and Artie Shaw.

In September 1944, I entered Salisbury State Teachers College where I attended three years and two summers. I practice taught in Centreville Jr. High School where I remained for four years. There was a shortage of teachers because many young men had entered the military service due to World War II . My salary for my first year was \$2100. During this time, I earned my B.S. degree and married Charles Rathell on April 2, 1948 at the Hillsboro Queen Anne Methodist Church.

After teaching for two years in Talbot County at the Cordova Elementary School, I retired to begin my family. Charles R. Rathell III was born August 29, 1953. Jeffery Douglas Rathell was born on January 18, 1957. We purchased a house in Hillsboro where we lived until 1966 and I taught at Denton Junior High School for seven years.

In 1966 we purchased our present home known as Buckingham Farm which was located near my husband's business ABC Farm Equipment in Skipton. It was great fun to restore the old farm house as part of the house was originally built in the 1700s and part of it built in 1810. We added additional new rooms . This project took over a year to complete and created our interest and love of old houses and antiques. A special treat was attending House and Garden Pilgrimages.

Easton Middle School was the last teaching position I held before retiring in the early eighties. There I taught Language Arts for 7^{th} and 8^{th} graders. Now I look back fondly at those 28 years of teaching.

Before Charles' death in 2009, we enjoyed traveling. Over the years we visited England, Hawaii, Mexico, France ,Spain, Switzerland, Canada, and the Caribbean Islands. But you know we both agreed that Talbot County is hard to beat.

Charles and I were married over 60 years, had two wonderful sons and daughter in laws, four grandchildren and one great grandchild. There is not a day that goes by with out seeing or hearing from my family. I was named "Sweet Thing" by my first grandchild and that remains my family name! OK go ahead and laugh, but life is good!"
